

The year in numbers



Some highlights

- Based on the experiences and insights generated from the pilot VAT-lottery in Tegeta Tax Region, the Government of Tanzania will roll-out a countrywide VAT-lottery, starting in 2024.
- Two international conferences in Africa (Dakar and Zanzibar) were organized in collaboration with the TaxCapDev-network.
- Implementation of two extensive business surveys on the private sector's experiences with and views of the tax systems in Zanzibar and mainland Tanzania.
- Odd-Helge Fjeldstad and Ingrid Hoem Sjursen have contributed to the *Human Development Report 2023/24* with a chapter on "The role of trust and norms in tax compliance in Africa".
- Ingrid Hoem Sjursen was invited to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs' *Dialogue Forum for Norway's New Africa Strategy* and gave a presentation on the importance of and challenges for domestic revenue generation in Africa. Oslo, 8 December 2023.
- Vincent Somville was promoted to full professor at the Norwegian School of Economics.



Background: What we do, why and how

<u>Chr. Michelsen Institute</u> (CMI) has been a leading research environment on taxation and development both nationally and internationally for almost 30 years. The overarching objective of CMI's research on taxation and public finance is to generate knowledge on how governments in poor countries can raise and manage domestic financial resources in ways that enhance their effectiveness and political legitimacy.

Our research is primarily based on methods from economics and political science, but is also based on law, history, social anthropology, and psychology. We apply both qualitative and quantitative methods. Our data sources include administrative data from African tax administrations, existing and surveys of individuals and businesses, lab and field experiments, historical data, and interviews with key international and national actors.

Most of our projects are designed and carried out in collaboration with local researchers and institutions in African countries, and most publications are co-authored with colleagues from partner institutions. This contributes to a good understanding of the context in which research is carried out, strengthening the relevance of research to inform tax policy, as well as developing local research capacity in individuals and institutions.

The Annual Report 2023 provides an overview of key people, research projects, publications, seminar contributions and organization of other activities by CMI's Tax Research Group.

This team works with a large network of collaborators in Norway, Europe, and Africa.



RCN funded projects and activities

In 2023, the *Tax and Public Finance Group* was involved in six projects funded by the <u>Research Council of Norway</u> (RCN), and one study funded by the <u>International Growth Centre</u> (IGC). The portfolio corresponds to more than NOK 52 million (2019-2025).

 - Activities in 2023: Capacity development workshop, Zanzibar 6-7 February, on tax administrative data and the design and implementation of a business survey to gain better understanding of taxpayers' views and attitudes on taxation. Joint work between ZRA, NTA and CMI on cleaning administrative tax data in ZRA, and how ZRA's administrative data can be used to inform tax policies and the public in Zanzibar.
 - Implementation of two business surveys in mainland Tanzania and Zanzibar (August-October) in collaboration with Zanzibar National Chamber of Commerce (ZNCC) and Tanzania Chamber of Commerce, Industry and Agriculture (TCCIA).
 - Contribution with a chapter on "The role of norms, culture and trust in tax compliance" for UNDP's *Human Development Report* 2023/24.





2. Successful Advances in Fiscal ARchItecture (SAFARI): Evidence from a new tax in Zanzibar (2021-25).

- Activities in 2023: Two lab-field experiments were conducted in collaboration with REPOA in February 2023. One focused on willingness-to-pay for mobile money in Tanzania, and the other studied tax compliance behaviour and attitudes among market traders in Dar es Salaam.



3. Strengthening fragile states through taxation (FRAGTAX) (2021-25).

 - **Description:** This is the third phase of the TaxCapDev-network, originally initiated in 2015. In 2021, the network has expanded its reach by formalizing collaboration with research institutions in Denmark, Norway, Senegal, South Africa, and Tanzania.
 - Activities in 2023: A monthly newsletter was launched in April 2021 and has by May 2023 about 300 subscribers. The newsletter features recent research and activities from network members as well as from other institutions. Odd-Helge Fjeldstad and Ingrid Hoem Sjursen are members of the editorial committee. In close collaboration with CMI's communication and IT-departments, the network has developed a website that was launched in March 2022: TaxCapDev Knowledge-based exchange on taxation and capital flight. The website was managed by Sunniva Ingholm until June 2023 and thereafter by Johanne Thoen Hansen.
- 5. Public services, security and the legacy of pre-colonial states in Uganda (2020-2024)

 - Activities in 2023: The paper "Pre-colonial centralization and tax compliance norms in contemporary Uganda" by Ali and Fjeldstad was published in *Journal of Institutional Economics*. The paper was presented at the UNU-WIDER Conference *Revving up revenue for development the role of domestic resource mobilization* in Oslo, 6-8 September 2023, and at the TaxCapDev-conference *Perspectives on tax policy reforms and tax compliance in Africa*. Zanzibar, 27-28 November 2023, Fjeldstad has drafted a review paper on the "History of taxation in Uganda". Based on archive research, Godfrey Asiimwe and Rebecca Mayanja have drafted a background paper on pre-colonial, colonial and post-colonial taxation and service delivery in the Buganda Kingdom and among the Lango ethnic group. Fieldwork and data collection was carried out in May-December 2023 in four selected local government authorities in Uganda: Apach, Nakasongola, Mukono, and Hoima.



- 6. Tax compliance, VAT revenues and business development (TaCoTa) (2019-2024).

 - Activities in 2023: A pilot VAT-lottery and customer survey was implemented in Tegeta Tax Region, Dar es Salaam, June-October 2022. Findings from the pilot were presented at seminars and workshops in Zanzibar (February 2023), Stockholm University (23 March 2023) and at a UNU-WIDER seminar in Helsinki (May 2023). Two book chapters on the shaping of VAT-reforms in Tanzania have been published by Oxford University Press and Edward Elgar Publishing. One report on the pilot-lottery in Tegeta Tax Region has been submitted to TRA's management with recommendations to extend the lottery to other tax regions in Tanzania. Based on the experiences from the Tegeta-lottery, the Government of Tanzania has decided to roll out a nationwide VAT-lottery in 2024.

2. Tax for Development seminars

The *Tax and Public Finance Group* at CMI organized 20 webinars in the *Tax for Development Webinar Series* during the period October 2020 until June 2022. These webinars reached a wide global audience of academics, tax and development practitioners, and representatives from civil society. Since September 2022, the Tax Group has co-organized three in-person international conferences - one in Bergen (Norway), one in Dakar (Senegal) and one in Zanzibar (Tanzania) - and six in-person seminars in Bergen. In addition, members of the group have been engaged in and co-organized several other webinars and cross-disciplinary seminars in Norway and Tanzania.



In 2023, the Tax Group initiated the *Tax for Development Seminar Series*. Five in-person seminars took place at CMI in the period February-May 2023, and were moderated by Odd-Helge Fjeldstad and Ingrid Hoem Sjursen. The seminars featured ongoing research and initiatives on taxation and illicit financial flows, with participants from research institutions, the Norwegian Tax Administration and civil society organizations.
